Dear fellow shareholder,

Another strong period . . .

The Teberg Fund gained 7.10% for the six-month period from April 1, 2018 through September 30, 2018, which is covered in this report. This is the second best return achieved in a semi-annual reporting period in the past 10 years. It unseated last year's six-month return of 6.47%, which held the number-two spot at that time. The top six-month return of 35.11% was achieved from April 1, 2009 to September 30, 2009 when the market skyrocketed after the 2008 financial crisis.

The Fund's share price rose \$0.78 cents, from \$11.13 on the first trading day of the period to \$11.92 on the last.

The major stock market indexes had even stronger growth during the period. The Dow Jones Industrial Average (Dow) rose 11.02%, and the S&P 500® Index (S&P), the Fund's benchmark, climbed even higher with 11.41% growth.

Sharp twists and turns . . .

Right out of the gate, the market made it clear this could be an exciting period (or nauseating, if like me you prefer the relative calm and steadier growth of the recent past).

The Dow dropped more than 750 points during the first trading day of the period (Monday, April 2, 2018) but recovered somewhat before the close and ended down approximately 450 points. The Dow took another dive of 570 points on Friday that week but changed direction the next week and rose nearly 430 points on April 10, only to drop almost 220 points the next day.

This whipsaw action continued throughout much of the period, with the Dow bouncing from a low of 23,644 at the close of the first trading day, up and down to a high of 26,743 on September 21.

What seemed to characterize this period was that the same factors appeared to be behind both negative and positive market movements. First would come the worrisome news about potential threats, such as trade wars sparked by tariffs, threatened bombing of Syria, risks to tech

stocks from new regulation and a political crisis in Italy. Then there would be news that calmed fears about these potential dangers, and the market would quickly rebound, if only temporarily. There were even times when the market seemed to react more than once to the same negatives until fears were dispelled and the market rose again.

The worry that inflation would cause the Federal Reserve to hike interest rates was at least one of the factors that consistently created tension during the period, although the June 14 and September 27 rate increases didn't seem to immediately impact the market.

If it seems there was quicker reaction time to news about the market during the period, consider that the source was often tweeting, sometimes directly from the White House. If the market seemed more predictable in a bygone era, just think how long it took for the day's events to wind up on the evening news or tomorrow's newspaper compared to today's 24/7 information overload.

When the dust settled after all the turmoil, the Dow closed on the last trading day of September at 26,458, just 285 or so points lower than the September 21 period high.

The Teberg Fund's Scorecard . . .

Once again, we're in the position of explaining why a return we consider very respectable compares unfavorably with the higher returns of the indexes. It's clearly a sign of these unusual times that the Fund's 7.01% return for the period was noticeably lower than the double-digit returns of the Dow and S&P.

On the plus side, the Fund's portfolio remained nearly fully invested for the entire period with the greatest percentage in exchange-traded funds (ETFs). These positions included ETFs representing nearly equal weightings in the major indexes, including not only the Dow and S&P but also the NASDAQ Composite



Index. There were also positions designed to track small- and mid-cap indexes. Rounding out the ETF portfolio were financial, semiconductor and technology holdings. All increased in value during the period, but the leaders were the ETFs tracking the NASDAQ, Russell 2000, and the S&P 500 and Small Cap indexes, due of course to the strong performance of each.

The value of the high-yield bond holdings increased modestly during the period, but certainly didn't match the growth of the ETFs. This attributed to the lag in the Fund's performance compared to the growth of the indexes.

Another drain on the Fund's return was holding a slightly larger cash position after the sale of a technology ETF in August to lock in profit. The proceeds remained in cash throughout the rest of the period with nominal earnings.

Looking ahead . . .

By the time this reaches you, the midterm election will be over and we'll know how the market reacted to the outcome. Regardless, we'll probably welcome the break from another season of overheated campaigning, which could have benefitted from a big dose of Minnesota nice, although it got testy here too.

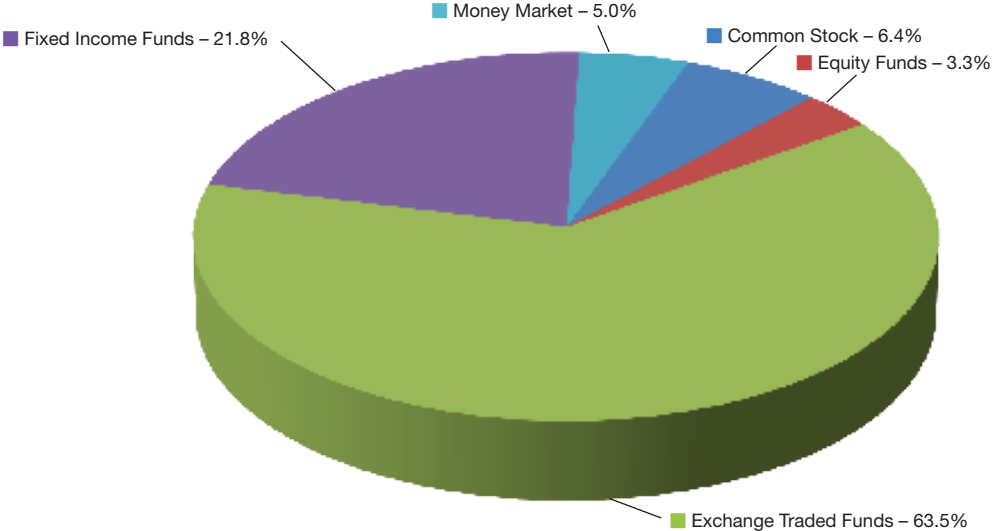

NOTE 1 - ORGANIZATION

The Teberg Fund (the “Fund”) is a diversified series of shares of beneficial interest of the Northern Lights Fund Trust III (the “Trust”), a statutory trust organized under the laws of the state of Delaware. The Trust is registered under the Investment Company Act of 1940, as amended, (the “1940 Act”), as an open-end management investment company. The Fund began operations on April 1, 2002 as a series of the Advisors Series Trust and reorganized into the Trust on December 13, 2013. The investment objective of the Fund is to maximize total return (capital appreciation plus income).

NOTE 2 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following is a summary of significant accounting policies consistently followed by the Fund. These policies are in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (“GAAP”). The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of increases and decreases in net assets from operations during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. The Fund is an investment company and accordingly follows the investment company accounting and reporting guidance of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standard Codification Topic 946 “Financial Services – Investment Companies”.

The Fund may hold securities, such as private investments, interests in commodity pools, other non-traded securities or temporarily illiquid securities, for which market quotations are not readily available or are determined to be unreliable. These securities will be valued using the “fair value” procedures approved by the Trust’s Board of Trustees (the “Board”). The Board has delegated execution of these procedures to a fair value team composed of one or more representatives from each of the (i) Trust, (ii) administrator, and (iii) advisor. The team may also enlist third party consultants such as a valuation specialist at a public accounting firm, valuation consultant or financial officer of a security issuer on an as-needed basis to assist in determining a security-specific fair value. The Board reviews and ratifies the execution of this process and the resultant fair value prices at least quarterly to assure the process produces reliable results.

- A. **Security Valuation:** Securities listed on an exchange are valued at the last reported sale price at the close of the regular trading session of the exchange on the business day the value is being determined, or in the case of securities listed on NASDAQ at the NASDAQ Official Closing Price (“NOCP”). In the absence of a sale, such securities shall be valued at the mean between the current bid and ask prices on the day of valuation. Investments in open-end investment companies are valued at net asset value. Futures and future options are valued at the final settled price or, in the absence of a settled price, at the last sale price on the day of valuation. Debt securities (other than short-term obligations) are valued each day by an independent pricing service approved by the Board based on methods which include consideration of:

yields or prices of securities of comparable quality, coupon, maturity and type, indications as to values from dealers, and general market conditions or market quotations from a major market maker in the securities. Investments valued in currencies other than the U.S. dollar are converted to U.S. dollars using exchange rates obtained from pricing services. Short-term debt obligations having 60 days or less remaining until maturity, at time of purchase, may be valued at amortized cost. Investments in open-end investment companies are valued at net asset value.

- B. Federal Income Taxes:** It is the Fund's policy to continue to comply with the requirements of the Internal Revenue Code applicable to regulated investment companies and to distribute all of its taxable income to its shareholders. Therefore, no provision for Federal income tax is required.

The Fund recognizes the tax benefits of uncertain tax positions only where the position is "more likely than not" to be sustained assuming examination by tax authorities. Management has analyzed the Fund's tax positions and has concluded that no liability for unrecognized tax benefits should be recorded related to uncertain tax positions taken on returns filed for open tax years ended March 31, 2015 to March 31, 2017, or expected to be taken in the Fund's March 31, 2018 year-end tax returns. The Fund identifies its major tax jurisdictions as U.S. Federal and the state of Nebraska. The Fund is not aware of any tax positions for which it is reasonably possible that the total amounts of unrecognized tax benefits will change materially in the next twelve months.

- C. Security Transactions and Investment Income:** Investment security transactions are accounted for on a trade date basis. Cost is determined and gains and losses are based upon the specific identification method for both financial statement and federal income tax purposes. Dividend income is recorded on the ex-dividend date and interest income is recorded on an accrual basis. Purchase discounts and premiums on securities are accreted and amortized over the life of the respective securities.
- D. Distributions to Shareholders:** Distributions from net investment income, if any, are declared and paid at least annually and are recorded on the ex-dividend date. The Fund will declare and pay net realized capital gains, if any, annually. The character of income and gains to be distributed is determined in accordance with federal income tax regulations, which may differ from GAAP. These "book/tax" differences are considered either temporary (i.e., deferred losses, capital loss carry forwards) or permanent in nature. To the extent these differences are permanent in nature, such amounts are reclassified within the composition of net assets based on their federal tax-basis treatment; temporary differences do not require classification. Any such reclassifications will have no effect on net assets, results from operations, or net asset value per share of the Fund.
- E. Valuation of Fund of Funds:** The Fund may invest in portfolios of open-end or closed-end investment companies (the "underlying funds"). Open-end investment companies are valued at their respective net asset values

as reported by such investment companies. The underlying funds value securities in their portfolios for which market quotations are readily available at their market values (generally the last reported sale price) and all other securities and assets at their fair value by the methods established by the boards of the underlying funds. The shares of many closed-end investment companies, after their initial public offering, frequently trade at a price per share, which is different than the net asset value per share. The difference represents a market premium or market discount of such shares. There can be no assurances that the market discount or market premium on shares of any closed-end investment company purchased by the Fund will not change.

- F. *Expenses:*** Expenses of the Trust that are directly identifiable to a specific fund are charged to that fund. Expenses which are not readily identifiable to a specific fund, are allocated in such a manner as deemed equitable, taking into consideration the nature and type of expense and the relative sizes of the funds in the Trust.
- G. *Indemnification:*** The Trust indemnifies its officers and Trustees for certain liabilities that may arise from the performance of their duties to the Trust. Additionally, in the normal course of business, the Fund enters into contracts that contain a variety of representations and warranties and which provide general indemnities. The Fund's maximum exposure under these arrangements is unknown, as this would involve future claims that may be made against the Fund that have not yet occurred. However, based on experience, the Fund expects the risk of loss due to these warranties and indemnities to be remote.
- H. *Exchange Traded Funds:*** The Fund may invest in exchange-traded funds ("ETFs"). ETFs are a type of index fund bought and sold on a securities exchange. An ETF trades like common stock and represents a fixed portfolio of securities designed to track the performance and dividend yield of a particular domestic or foreign market index. The Fund may purchase an ETF to temporarily gain exposure to a portion of the U.S. or a foreign market. The risks of owning an ETF generally reflect the risks of owning the underlying securities they are designed to track, although the lack of liquidity on an ETF could result in it being more volatile. Additionally, ETFs have fees and expenses that reduce their value.

NOTE 3 – SECURITIES VALUATION

Fair Valuation Process: As noted above, the fair value team is composed of one or more representatives from each of the (i) Trust, (ii) administrator, and (iii) advisor. The applicable investments are valued collectively via inputs from each of these groups. For example, fair value determinations are required for the following securities: (i) securities for which market quotations are insufficient or not readily available on a particular business day (including securities for which there is a short and temporary lapse in the provision of a price by the regular pricing source), (ii) securities for which, in the judgment of the advisor, the prices or values available do not represent the fair value of the instrument. Factors which may cause the advisor to make such a judgment include, but are not limited to, the following: only a bid price or an asked price is available; the spread between bid and asked prices is substantial; the frequency of sales; the thinness of the market; the size of reported trades; and actions of the securities markets, such as the suspension or limitation of trading; (iii) securities determined to be illiquid; (iv) securities with respect to which an event that will affect the value thereof has occurred (a “significant event”) since the closing prices were established on the principal exchange on which they are traded, but prior to the Fund’s calculation of its net asset value. Specifically, interests in commodity pools or managed futures pools are valued on a daily basis by reference to the closing market prices of each futures contract or other asset held by a pool, as adjusted for pool expenses. Restricted or illiquid securities, such as private investments or non-traded securities are valued via inputs from the advisor based upon the current bid for the security from two or more independent dealers or other parties reasonably familiar with the facts and circumstances of the security (who should take into consideration all relevant factors as may be appropriate under the circumstances). If the advisor is unable to obtain a current bid from such independent dealers or other independent parties, the fair value team shall determine the fair value of such security using the following factors: (i) the type of security; (ii) the cost at date of purchase; (iii) the size and nature of the Fund’s holdings; (iv) the discount from market value of unrestricted securities of the same class at the time of purchase and subsequent thereto; (v) information as to any transactions or offers with respect to the security; (vi) the nature and duration of restrictions on disposition of the security and the existence of any registration rights; (vii) how the yield of the security compares to similar securities of companies of similar or equal creditworthiness; (viii) the level of recent trades of similar or comparable securities; (ix) the liquidity characteristics of the security; (x) current market conditions; and (xi) the market value of any securities into which the security is convertible or exchangeable.

The Fund utilizes various methods to measure the fair value of all of its investments on a recurring basis. GAAP establishes a hierarchy that prioritizes inputs to valuation methods. The three levels of input are:

Level 1 – Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and liabilities that the Fund has the ability to access.

Level 2 – Observable inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly.

These inputs may include quoted prices for the identical instrument on an inactive market, prices for similar instruments, interest rates, prepayment speeds, credit risk, yield curves, default rates and similar data.

Level 3 – Unobservable inputs for the asset or liability, to the extent relevant observable inputs are not available, representing the Fund’s own assumptions about the assumptions a market participant would use in valuing the asset or liability, and would be based on the best information available.

The availability of observable inputs can vary from security to security and is affected by a wide variety of factors, including, for example, the type of security, whether the security is new and not yet established in the marketplace, the liquidity of markets, and other characteristics particular to the security. To the extent that valuation is based on models or inputs that are less observable or unobservable in the market, the determination of fair value requires more judgment. Accordingly, the degree of judgment exercised in determining fair value is greatest for instruments categorized in Level 3.

The inputs used to measure fair value may fall into different levels of the fair value hierarchy. In such cases, for disclosure purposes, the level in the fair value hierarchy within which the fair value measurement falls in its entirety, is determined based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement in its entirety.

The inputs or methodology used for valuing securities are not necessarily an indication of the risk associated with investing in those securities. The following tables summarize the inputs used as of September 30, 2018 for the Fund’s investments measured at fair value:

NOTE 5 – INVESTMENT ADVISORY AGREEMENT AND TRANSACTIONS WITH RELATED PARTIES

First Associated Investment Advisors, Inc. (the “Advisor”) serves as investment advisor to the Fund. Subject to the authority of the Board, the Advisor is responsible for the Fund’s investment portfolio. Pursuant to an advisory agreement with the Trust, on behalf of the Fund, the Advisor, under the oversight of the Board, directs the daily operations of the Fund and supervises the performance of administrative and professional services provided by others. As compensation for its services and the related expenses borne by the Advisor, the Fund pays the Advisor a fee, computed and accrued daily and paid monthly at an annual rate of 1.25% of the Fund’s average daily net assets. For the six months ended September 30, 2018, the Advisor earned advisory fees of \$185,756.

Pursuant to a written contract (the “Waiver Agreement”), the Advisor has agreed at least until July 31, 2019, to waive a portion of its advisory fee and has agreed to reimburse the Fund for other expenses to the extent necessary so that the total operating expenses incurred by the Fund (exclusive of any front-end contingent or deferred loads, brokerage fees and commissions, acquired fund fees and expenses, borrowing costs (such as interest and dividend expense on securities sold short), taxes, and extraordinary expenses, such as litigation expenses (which may include indemnification of Fund officers and Trustees, contractual indemnification of Fund service providers (other than the Advisor)) do not exceed 1.75% of the Fund’s daily average net assets (the “expense limitation”). For the six months ended September 30, 2018, the Advisor waived \$65,824 in fees under the Waiver Agreement.

If the Advisor waives any fee or reimburses any expense pursuant to the Waiver Agreement, and the Fund’s Operating Expenses are subsequently less than the lessor of the expense limitation then in place or in place at time of waiver, the Advisor shall be entitled to reimbursement by the Fund for such waived fees or reimbursed expenses provided that such reimbursement does not cause the Fund’s expenses to exceed the expense limitation. If the Fund’s Operating Expenses subsequently exceed the expense limitation, the reimbursements shall be suspended. The Advisor may seek reimbursement only for expenses waived or paid by it during the three years prior to such reimbursement; provided, however, that such expenses may only be reimbursed to the extent they were waived or paid after the date of the Waiver Agreement (or any similar agreement). As of September 30, 2018, the total amount of expense reimbursement subject to recapture amounted to \$356,159, of which \$110,142 will expire on March 31, 2019, \$116,517 will expire on March 31, 2020, and \$129,500 will expire on March 31, 2021.

Distributor - The Board has adopted, on behalf of the Fund, the Trust's Master Distribution and Shareholder Servicing Plan (the "Plan") pursuant to Rule 12b-1 of the 1940 Act. The Plan provides that a monthly service and/or distribution fee is calculated by the Fund at an annual rate of 0.25% of the average daily net assets and is paid to Northern Lights Distributors, LLC (the "Distributor") to provide compensation for ongoing distribution-related activities or services and/or maintenance of the Fund's shareholder accounts, not otherwise required to be provided by the Advisor. Pursuant to the Plan, \$37,151 in distribution fees were incurred during the six months ended September 30, 2018.

In addition, certain affiliates of the Distributor provide services to the Fund as follows:

Gemini Fund Services, LLC ("GFS"), an affiliate of the Distributor, provides administration, fund accounting, and transfer agent services to the Trust. Pursuant to separate servicing agreements with GFS, the Fund pays GFS customary fees for providing administration, fund accounting and transfer agency services to the Fund. Certain officers of the Trust are also officers of GFS, and are not paid any fees directly by the Fund for serving in such capacities.

Northern Lights Compliance Services, LLC ("NLCS"), an affiliate of GFS and the Distributor, provides a Chief Compliance Officer to the Trust, as well as related compliance services, pursuant to a consulting agreement between NLCS and the Trust. Under the terms of such agreement, NLCS receives customary fees from the Fund.

Blu Giant, LLC ("Blu Giant"), an affiliate of GFS and the Distributor, provides EDGAR conversion and filing services as well as print management services for the Fund on an ad-hoc basis. For the provision of these services, Blu Giant receives customary fees from the Fund.

NOTE 6 – PURCHASES AND SALES OF SECURITIES

The cost of purchases and proceeds from the sale of securities, other than U.S. Government securities and short-term investments, for the six months ended September 30, 2018, amounted to \$2,380,665 and \$410,916, respectively.

NOTE 8 – NEW ACCOUNT PRONOUNCMENTS

In August 2018, the FASB issued Accounting Standards Update (“ASU”) No. 2018-13, which changes certain fair value measurement disclosure requirements. The new ASU, in addition to other modifications and additions, removes the requirement to disclose the amount and reasons for transfers between Level 1 and Level 2 of the fair value hierarchy, and the policy for the timing of transfers between levels. For investment companies, the amendments are effective for financial statements issued for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2019, and interim periods within those fiscal years. Early adoption is allowed. At this time, management is evaluating the implications of the ASU and any impact on the financial statement disclosures.

In September 2018, the Securities and Exchange Commission released Final Rule 33-10532 captioned “Disclosure Update and Simplification” which is intended to amend certain disclosure requirements that have become redundant, duplicative, overlapping, outdated or superseded, in light of other Commission disclosure requirements, GAAP, or changes in the information environment. These changes will be effective November 5, 2018.

NOTE 9 – SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Subsequent events after the date of the Statement of Assets and Liabilities have been evaluated through the date the financial statements were issued. Management has concluded that there were no events requiring adjustment or disclosure in the financial statements.
